The meeting was to discuss our program with the Walled Lake and Milford schools, and also about getting in touch with other schools recommended by our Committee.

Wysong reported on the Boys Camp. It seems as though a time was had by all. The boys showed up on time, their duffle in good shape, and all ready to go. The plane arrived late, and after stowing the duffle the kids climbed aboard, but the load was too heavy, and the plane couldn't take off. After trying everywhere to get more planes, it was finally decided that if one of the parents would agree to drive the duffle to the camp it was thought the plane could take the boys. A volunteer to drive the luggage stepped forward, and the plane took off. One plane was forced down; the one with the two smallest kids in it. The boys had to hold the plane's tail up, until the pilot could take off. One of the lads had inhaled so much dust in holding up the planes tail, he became air sick. The landing field was three miles on one side of town and the camp was ten miles on the other side. Monty called the largest taxi service in town to meet the kids and get them to camp. On Sun., Aug. 28, a meeting of Farmers and Sportsmen held in Lapeer, Mich. at the Lapeer County Bldg. It was sponsored by the Mich. Farm Bureau. The meeting was well attended by Lapeer Co. farmers and two representatives from each Sportsmens Club in southeastern Mich.

Dan Reed, Secretary of the Mich Farm Bureau, has been holding these meetings throughout southern Mich for the last two years. His aim, to encourage better understanding between Farmers & Sportsmen.

From the discussions and talks with some of the farmers, I felt as if the farmers were very interested in conservation and cooperating with hunters.

A round table discussion between Farmers & Sportsmen was held and the questions of Road Hunting and Trespassing were thoroughly discussed. The Williamston Plan on issuing permits to hunters by the farmers was brought up and Frank Burch (Detroit Sportsmen Congress) told the farmers they should take it upon themselves to organize and the Sportsmens clubs would give them all the help they needed.

Some of the farmers said they permitted hunting on their property but when they went north deer hunting the land was fenced and patrolled.

The farmers urged the hunter to ask permission early. Don't wait until the last minute! Also when you get permission stay on the farmer's property where he told you to hunt and don't get him into trouble with his neighbors.

Mr. Williams, of The Williams Gun Sight Co. of Davison, told of a friend of his, a Mr. Pruitt, who was in his opinion the greatest sportsmen he ever knew. He went into the field often but never carried a gun. His pockets were always filled with clover seed and every time he found a suitable place he sowed the seed for game. He said there was no reason why the clover wouldn't grow in the north if so planted and if it grew there the birds would go there and so enlarge the hunting area.

To wind up the program, Art Peterson of Mich. Conservation Dept. showed slides on Game Habitat and how they were helping the farmers provide food and cover on their land.

Oh yes, I almost forgot the best part of all, the wonderful buffet style dinner provided by the ladies of the Farm Bureau.

habitat. Also, experience from past releases made by clubs, individuals and the Department in various other northern areas helped eliminate all but the Lake county region. The sites are remote, have some water and a good stand of oak trees, all of which are important for turkeys.

The releases are an extension of the Department's current attempt to re-establish the big wild birds in Michigan. Two hundred were released in Allegan state forest last year and a number of broods of young have been observed there this year.

Turkeys formerly were common in the state but disappeared about the turn of the century.

**Deer Damage to Trees**

Deer damaged 80 young cherry and apple trees on the farm of William Dalton, one mile east of Fennville, recently.

The damage complaint was another indication of growing deer numbers in the southern lower peninsula.

Conservation Department field workers investigated the damage.

Despite a long record of adequate disposal and resultant stream quality which prompted extensive trout planting and stream improvement works by Conservation Dept., Cedar Springs casually turned its entire effluent into the stream when the time came to replace filter sand. The stream turned black, grew festoons of slime and disgorged its trout.

The question of direct damages is for the Conservation Commission but local and visiting fishermen as well as local retailers of goods and services will reap effects of the careless act.

## Archer Season to Run October 1-November 5

Michigan archers will be able to hunt deer with bow and arrow statewide from October 1 to November 5 this year, as usual.

Firearm hunters will also have their usual November 15-30 season.

And in Allegan county, the archery season will run October 1-December 15 and the special 1500-permit firearm season will be held December 1-11.

The Conservation Commission authorized the seasons at a recent meeting at Higgins Lake.

Exceptions and changes from last year are:

1) Archers can take "any deer" statewide except in Menominee, Emmet, Cheboygan, Bay and Huron counties and the mainland of Chippewa county, where only a legal buck may be taken.

2) There will be no special any deer season in the northern lower peninsula.

3) The area in the Allegan county special firearm season is somewhat larger to include more deer damage fruit and farm land.

## Release 700 Muskies In Holly Area Lakes

About 700 young muskies were released into Valley and Wildwood Lakes northwest of Pontiac early this week.

The fish ranged from three to 11 inches in length. Earlier, 2,400 five-inch muskies were released in the two connected lakes. Both are inside Holly recreation area and provide good water to carry forward part of the state's pilot musky study.

Included in this week's planting were 300-400 fish three to five inches long and 321 fin-clipped fish, seven to 11 inches long.

The fish came from Drayton Plains hatchery and had to be planted when a shortage of suitable live food developed.

To date this year, nearly 5,000 young muskies have been released in a few experimental waters.

The birds, now well on their way to adulthood, will be released in the Allegan area in the near future.
