## Yellow Safest Color

Yellow, not red, is the safety color for hunters to wear, according to tests conducted in California recently.

Army personnel, who took part in the tests, report that bright yellow is the most readily visible color under all light conditions. The tests reported were conducted in typical deer terrain under simulated hunting conditions.

The color study was conducted by the National Rifle Association, working with the California Game and Fish Department and the California Optometric Association.

# October Board Meeting

Wed., Oct. 24, 1956

Meeting was called to order by Chairman Welbon at 8:00 p.m. with the following members absent: Harry Sutton, Ed Olsen. The minutes of the September Board meeting were accepted as printed in the Multi-Laker

The President's report was as follows: He asked for \$250.00 for Bill King's election committee. Moved by Adams, seconded by Chaplow we grant said amount. Motion carried. Peters moved we allow \$200.00 for the Kid's Christmas Party. Seconded by Chaplow, carried. The bill for Harold Beagle for \$141.00 for repairing backstop on the rifle range was presented. Seconded by Chabot, motion carried. Lin Bush had presented an estimated cost of \$504.43 for new public address system. Moved by Horner we purchase the P. A. system from Bush. Seconded by Adams. Carried. Moved by Chaplow that all applicants for membership names be printed in the Multi-Laker and posted in the club house 30 days before being voted upon. Any member wanting to object to an applicant should appear before the board at the meeting when vote is held. Sec-

onded by Chabot. Carried.

Al Dixon made a tentative report on the Outdoorama and Detroit Times Field Dog Trials and commented that Multi-Lakes received a great deal of favorable publicity through the outdoor writers. He thought that next year's Outdoorama should be moved up to mid-August. Moved by Chabot that Al Dixon as Committee Chairman return \$1250.00 of the amount advanced them and retain \$250. for advance work on next year's program. Seconded by Gladstone, the motion carried. Wysong thought that the opinion of the board should be printed in headlines in the Multi-Laker as favoring an annual Outdoorama.

Marion Pullis was present and asked for the date of December 2 for a Turkey Shoot and Fish Dinner, and for \$150.00 for said Fish Dinner. He also asked advice on what to do about members using skeet and trap range on evenings and Saturdays. He also asked for permission to hold the Turkey Shoot immediately adjacent to the club house on the east, permission to block off two roads during said Turkey Shoot, and permission to set Mo-Skeet-O range just outside club house on east lawn. Moved by Adams, seconded by Gladstone, that date be approved and \$150.00 be advanced for Fish Dinner. Motion carried. It was also the opinion of the board that the handling of the skeet and trap range be permanently under the jurisdiction of the Skeet and Trap committee. Permission was granted for Pullis' other requests.

Ken Cracknell of the Athletic committee made a report showing that expenses incurred were \$140.90 and returned \$34.10 to the club of the \$175.00 advanced.

# October Membership Meeting

Wed., Oct. 17, 1956

The meeting was called to order by President Chabot at 8:00 p.m. with the following officers present:

- Ray Chabot.....President
- Walt Peters.....Vice President

The members present stood and pledged allegiance to the Flag, and recited the Conservation Pledge.

The minutes of the September Regular, and September Board Meetings were accepted as printed in the Multi-Laker.

Nick Lup for the nominating Committee made a report of the Committee's slate of officers for 1957 which appears elsewhere in this issue. Moved by Harvey, seconded by Crise, that the report be accepted and the Committee discharged. Motion carried.

Ilo Bartlett of the Game Division of the Conservation Dept. was present, and together with illustrated slides, gave a picture of the coming deer season.

Officers from the nearby Nike base were in attendance. They gave a vivid description of our guided missile projects. A short film was shown, which demonstrated better than words, the actual accomplishments of the

Nike.

Al Dixon for Outdoorama asked to have his report deferred until our next meeting, as the hour was growing late.

Arnold Larges for Stag Day, presented a preliminary report of \$1,550.00 profit, with a full report due at our November meeting.

Wm. King, for By Laws, presented the following proposals:

I. Section 1 of Article 4, be changed to read "That all members of the Board of Directors, shall, during the term of their office be exempt from the payment of dues in this association." Motion was lost.

II. Add to Section 1 of Article 4, "That all past Presidents of this Association, and all future Presidents, upon the expiration of their term of office, shall be exempt from the payment of dues to this Association." Motion carried.

III. Add new section, known as Section 5 to Article 3: "The said Board of Directors shall be authorized to name as Honorary Members in this Association, with all privileges thereof, but with no vote, persons who shall do, perform, or cause to be done, or performed, acts in the furtherance of the principles of this Association which, in the opinion of the Board of Directors, shall be considered outstanding, and of sufficient

importance to merit the distinction. Said Honorary Membership shall be for the period of one year, and may be renewed, by action of the said Board of Directors. Motion carried.

IV. Add to section 5, Article 3: That no full time employee of our Association be eligible to hold an elective office in said Association. Motion carried.

## Helvey Reports On Bob Mexico

"This letter is addressed to the membership of Multi-Lakes, their families and friends everywhere. The older members will remember me as their membership secretary from 1946 to 1952 inclusive and as president of the club in 1953. I make mention of this record of service to introduce myself to the many new members who do not know me due to my inactivity in club affairs the last two years. Here is a story I ask you to read carefully, and to act accordingly:

At a recent board of directors meeting I was appointed to a committee to investigate the needs of a young man living in our immediate community. Bob Mexico by name. Bob is a navy veteran who following his release from service contracted polio and is completely paralyzed except for the movement of his head. He and his wife, Pat, live in a cozy little home built for them by the Veterans of Foreign Wars and located near the V. F. W. clubhouse at Hickory Hills. Bob and Pat are repaying the Veterans for their home as they do not want and will not accept charity.

I have visited the Mexicos

in their home and have been so impressed by what they are doing for themselves. The veterans have helped them and Multi-Lakes has been approached to lend assistance also.

Here is how we can help: These young people are establishing a business to be operated from their home, and have the agency for subscriptions to approximately 500 magazines. It is not often that M. L. C. A. has sponsored any individual but we are now asking you individually and collectively to get behind this movement and get and keep it rolling.

Every person buys and renews subscriptions to magazines. All we ask is that when you do so that you channel them through the MEXICO MAGAZINE AGENCY, 2024 Royalton rd., Milford 3, Michigan. It will not cost you a penny more.

In addition to magazines Bob is handling Christmas cards, all kinds of greeting cards, and costume jewelry made by patients at Pontiac State hospital. Bob and his wife have a typewriter, gift of the Siroptomist Club of Pontiac, and an addressograph and mimeographing machine, given them by the Michigan State Rehabilitation organization.

Mrs. Mexico is an accomplished typist and stenographer and will handle any typing, mimeographing or stenciling jobs you may furnish them.

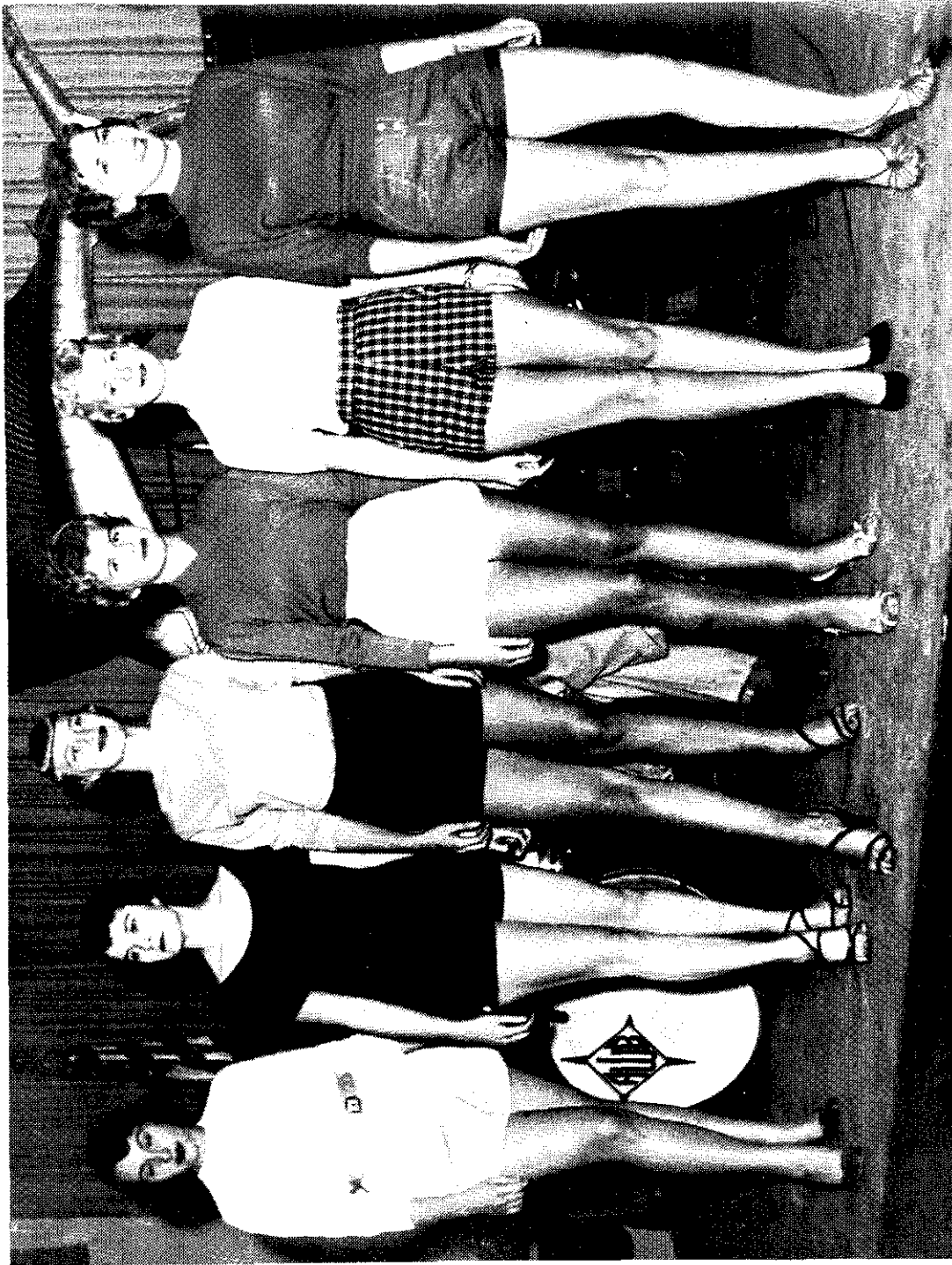
