

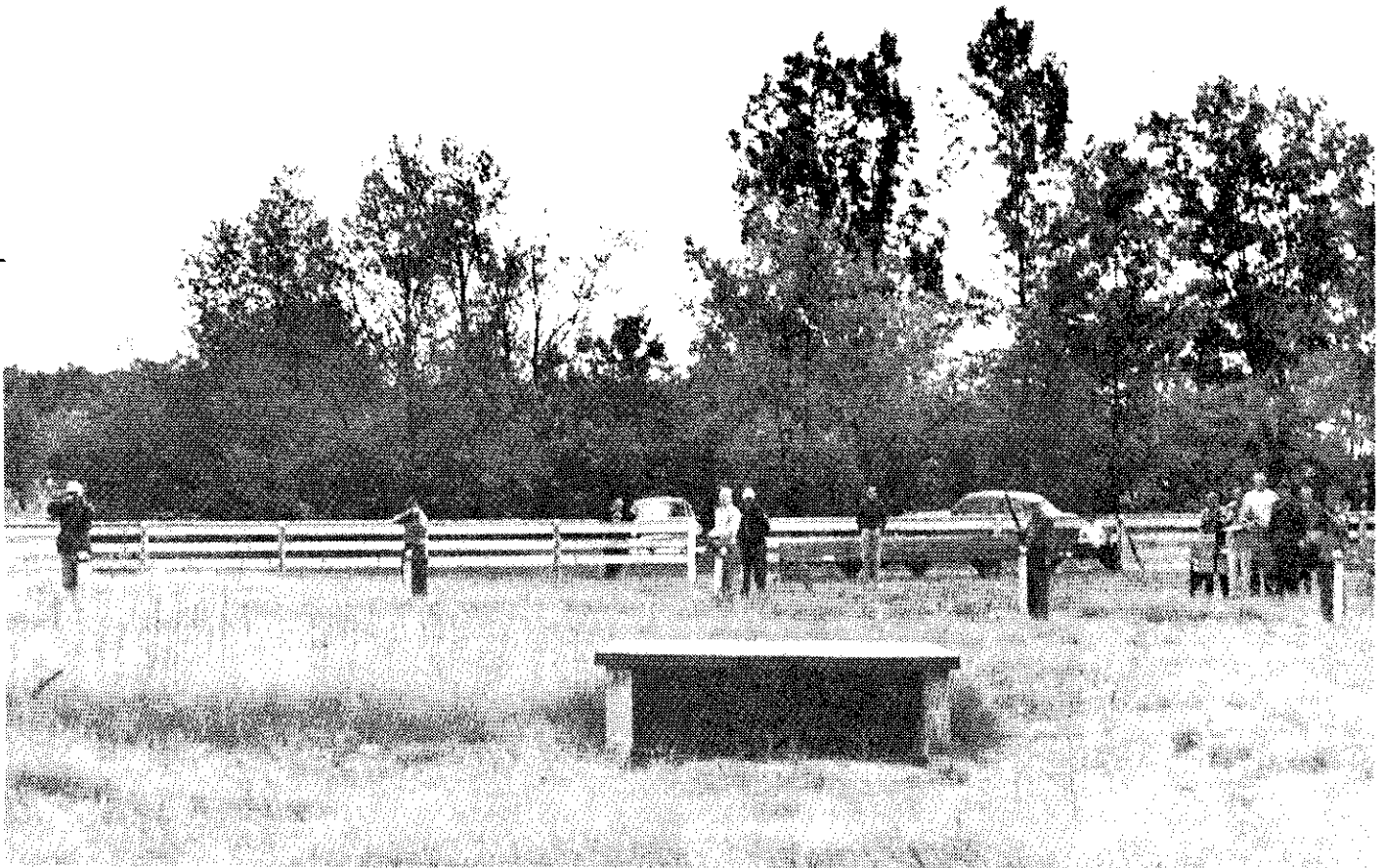

April Board Meeting

Wed. April 25, 1956

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Welbon at 8:10 p.m. with all members present.

Moved by Peters, seconded by Adams, that the regular order of business be waived to hear Floyd Snyder, Ken Cracknell and Alexander J. Watson. Motion carried.

Floyd Snyder reported that due to his wife's illness he would be unable to play during the months of July and August. The Board agreed to release Snyder from his obligation during those months.

Ken Cracknell reported there was not enough room on the back of our Little League's shirts for "Multi-Lakers Conservation Association", and Multi-Lakes Club" was agreed on. Our diamond is badly in need of a new backstop, and there is a matter of balls and bats for a "Blooper League". The Board granted Ken's request for \$175.00 to take care of these items.

Sandy Watson had noticed that a censorship committee for the Multi-Laker had been appointed, composed of members of the Board. He thought the committee should have a representative from the membership, and volunteered his services. He also thought "Censorship" wasn't a fitting symbol for this committee.

Crane moved that the name "Censorship Committee" be changed to the "Editorial Committee", seconded by Adams. Motion carried. Adams moved that Watson be appointed to the committee, seconded by Peters, motion carried.

Chabot moved that the minutes of the March Board meeting be dispensed with, seconded by Adams, motion carried.

Crane was in receipt of a check for \$87.50, in payment of interest on Gold Seal Certificate.

The Secretary expense for four months of \$60.00, and the Treasurer's expense for the same time of \$120.00 were allowed on motion by Chabot, and seconded by Purdie.

Tom Crane then presented his resignation as Treasurer. Moved by Purdie, seconded by Payne, that the resignation be

accepted with regrets and hopes for a successful future for Tom. Motion carried.

Clayton Adams reported he was in receipt of some 50 letters from children who had attended the Group Camp program at the Proud Lake area, thanking Multi-Lakes for making it possible for them to attend. These letters were turned over to the Editorial committee. Clayt also reported the planting of 600 pine trees, and many multiflora roses on our property by the Junior Conservation club of Walled Lake.

Building Committee Chairman Harry Horner presented estimated costs of our proposed building additions. Moved by Adams, seconded by Chaplow, the report be accepted. Adams then moved that on the report we save it to be a special order of business at a special Board meeting to be held on the ninth day of May at 8 p.m., and that the club depository at Milford be contacted concerning means of financing our proposed additions. Seconded by Peters, motion carried.

Walter Peters for Ground reported a very successful work bee last Sunday. Walt was granted an advance of \$150.00 for walks in the monument area.

Weldon Payne presented a bill for \$152.44 for the mimeograph machine now in the clubhouse. Moved by Adams, seconded by Chaplow, the bill be allowed. Motion carried.

Chabot nominated John Zepf for Treasurer of our club, and as there were no other nominations the Secretary was instructed to cast an unanimous ballot for Zepf. The term of office to take effect on May 9th.

Delegates named to the M.U. C.C. convention were Weldon Payne, Warren Neuenschwander, and Ray Chabot.

Monty Wysong, Weldon Payne and Tom Crane were named as delegates to District 7.

Moved by Chaplow, seconded by Olsen, we adjourn. Time 11:50 p.m.

April Membership Meeting

Wednesday, April 18

The meeting was called to order by President Chabot at 8.25 p.m. with the following officers present:

- Ray Chabot President
- Walt Peters Vice President
- Herb Harvey Secretary
- Tom Crane Treasurer
- Ed Olsen Memb. Secretary

The members present stood, pledged allegiance to the Flag and recited the Conservation pledge.

Moved by Welbon, seconded by Jones, that the minutes of the previous meeting be accepted as printed in the Multi-Laker. Motion lost. The minutes were then read, and approved as read.

Tom Crane read the Treasurer's report for March. It was regularly moved and seconded that the report be accepted as read. Motion carried.

Tom Crane then announced he was leaving the Club, for business reasons. Tom has been a member since 1942, during which time he served four years as a Board member, and three years as treasurer. The announcement was received with feelings of deep regret, everyone realizing we are losing a true and trusted friend, and a capable and willing officer of the Club.

Dennis Glen Cooper was present, and delivered some pertinent remarks about Michigan, after which he presented his picture, "Touring Glorious Michigan". The picture was splendidly done in color, and was given full attention by those present.

Art Liss for Archery reported good turnouts for the Friday night shoots. Eleven Junior shooters have turned out and

for the next four weeks will be shooting in the Range House. After which time everyone hopes to be able to move outdoors. If you have a son or daughter interested in learning Archery, bring them out. Capable instructors will be present to give advice. Club equipment is available for those who have none of their own. May 6th is the date for the first outdoor shoot. Art promised more particulars to be printed in the Multi-Laker.

Ed Olsen welcomed the new members, some 150 of them, and hoped theirs would be an active and vigorous membership, thereby being a credit to themselves, and to the Club.

Marion Pullis for Skeet and Trap, announced shoots for the next two Sundays. The first Sunday in May, the 6th, and the 20th, there will be a home and home match with Oakland County Sportsmens Club. A fifty bird match at both Skeet and Trap will be fired. Sunday, May 6th, at OCSC and on the 20th at our range. Come out and get on a team. We need shooters.

Weldon Payne for M.U.C.C. Award, explained to the new members how M.U.C.C. works. It now has a membership of some 60,000; representatives in Lansing to keep pace with the Legislative programs; publishes M.O.O.D. which keeps all members posted on all affairs pertaining to conservation. It is kept alive by a donation of 25 cents per member from each club. This is very small revenue which is the reason for the yearly raffle.

Weldon again urged each member to get behind the sale of these raffle tickets, and promised some worthwhile prizes for those selling the most.

Arnold Larges for Fish, announced he had 9 mooring spots

let at the dock. Better get your spot quick, boys. Arnold has brass tabs for each slot, so see him or Rahn for reservations. Trout season opens on the 28th. The Clubhouse will be open all night, and breakfast will be served. He again urged any members having an old boat lying around to remove same, or else.

Lin Bush for Rifle, reported good attendance for Juniors on Monday nights, Seniors on Tuesday nights, and Pistoleers on Thursday nights.

Warren Neuenschwander for Legislation, reported H.B. 101 (the deer control bill) dead as a dodo; however H.B. 503, which is acceptable to the Conservation Dept. is in the mill. He asked all present to contact Senators Prescott and Broomfield, and Reps. Van Horn and O'Connor, urging them to support this bill; simply address them in care of the Capitol Bldg., Lansing, Mich.

Clayton Adams for Junior Conservation reported a trip by several members to the Proud Lake Camp, last week, to observe 56 kids from Walled Lake enjoy the resources of this splendid recreation project. Milford will be the third group to attend the camp. Plans are being drawn to double the capacity of the camp. Clayt said he had 500 young pine trees, and 250 Multiflora rose bushes, which the Walled Lake Junior Conservation Club is going to help plant on our grounds. He also announced next Saturday as the next family night, "Treasure Island" and "Glamour Birds of Florida" are the pictures to be shown.

Walt Peters for House and Grounds announced a meeting for next Tuesday night at 8:00 p.m. A work bee will be held next Sunday. Bring your rakes. Refreshments at 12:00 noon.
