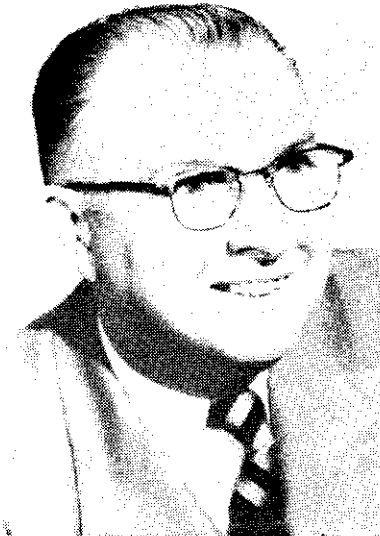

Nominees For 1958 M.L.C.A. Officers

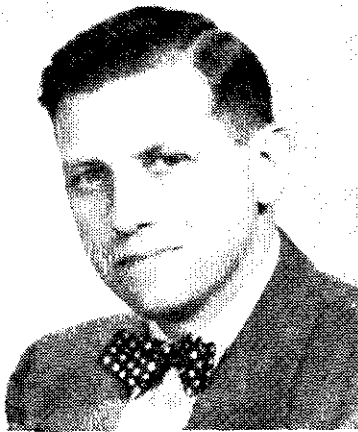
Election of officers for 1958 will be held at the annual election meeting Wednesday evening at 8 p.m. on December 18, 1957.

The members present stood and pledged allegiance to the Flag.

The minutes of the October Membership and October Board meetings were accepted as printed in the Multi-Laker.

The treasurer's report was read and accepted as read.

Early Appraisals Indicate Good Deer Season

Early appraisals of Michigan's 1957 deer season indicate hunters generally were more successful than last year.

Conservation Department reports based on traffic surveys, field investigations and highway checking station information predict an increase in the buck kill in the northern lower peninsula.

Final figures on hunting pressure and success will not be available, however, until statistical surveys are completed.

A decrease in the upper peninsula buck kill is expected despite a rise in the number of hunters north of the Straits, where weather conditions hampered activity.

Hunting conditions in the northern lower peninsula were about normal and several study areas report an increase in the number of antlered deer taken.

Overall, the buck kill is considered "fully as good as last year."

From the upper peninsula, some 7,888 deer were transported across the Straits Bridge by November 26, compared with 8,137 going south on ferries during the same period last year. This year's total includes some antlerless deer taken by permit holders in four U. P. special areas.

In the northern lower peninsula, hunters bagged 28 bucks by November 24 at the Gladwin Refuge — compared with 20 taken during the entire 1956 season.

Similar increases were recorded at Beaver Island and Bois Blanc Island, where the

kill through November 24 exceeded the entire season bag last year.

Drummond Island hunters transported 493 deer—including 370 bucks — from the island through November 24. Last season, 411 bucks were taken during the November 15-30 season.

Private shooting preserves may begin operations in 1958, following approval of preserve regulations by the state Conservation Commission at its November meeting. Rules and regulations governing licensing and operation of preserves provide for 150-day hunting seasons for released pheasants and mallard ducks on licensed preserves. Year-round shooting will be permitted on non-native upland game birds released by preserve operators.

Elk Is Illegally Shot

An elk, illegally shot by a bow and arrow hunter, October 3, had to be killed by conservation officers near Onaway.

The animal, a female, was found badly wounded near highway M-33, about 10 miles south of Onaway in Presque Isle county. The carcass was turned over to a nearby public school for use in the hot lunch program.

Elk are protected on a year-round basis in Michigan and this is the first ever reported shot by an archer.

Officers had not yet apprehended the person responsible, but were working on the case.

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More Deer Moving South In Michigan

More and more deer are being killed on southern Michigan highways each year.

Through October, about 600 whitetails had been killed in collisions with cars, trucks and other vehicles on state roadways south of the Muskegon-Bay City line.

The total, at year's end, will almost certainly be a record high. In 1954, highway accidents killed 378. The next year it jumped to 685 and last year it was up to 748. The statewide total last year was a record 3,127.

In addition, southern Michigan conservation officers estimate the real kill is actually about 10 percent higher when mortally injured deer that lose themselves in woodlands are accounted for.

The total southern Michigan loss has grown to one-third the size of the legal hunting season harvest of whitetails in southern Michigan counties.

Heaviest losses are usually sustained in Kent, Tuscola, Livingston, Oakland, Montcalm

and Calhoun counties.

But these roadway kills are not only a loss to wildlife; the car owner who hits a deer at high speed frequently lands in the hospital or beside his

wrecked vehicle. Michigan is not liable for such damage (though some states are) and insurance often doesn't cover such accidents.

So slow down, Mr. Motorist; don't make one of southern Michigan's whitetails your roadway nemesis.

Buck Attacks Heifer

A 450-pound cow had to be killed after suffering serious injury apparently inflicted by a buck deer—west of Carson City in Montcalm county.

The cow, a heifer, was found paralyzed in Fish Creek. Investigation by Conservation Department workers revealed the cow had suffered head and back injuries. Marks on the animal indicated the injuries were caused by a deer's antlers and hooves.

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Will Find Double Ski-Tow In Operation

Skiers at popular Porcupine Mountains state park in Gogebic county this season will find a new T-bar, double ski tow in operation.

Installation of the new tow is scheduled for completion December 22 and operation will begin as soon as there is sufficient snow for skiing.

The tow has a capacity of 1,200 rides per hour and runs 2,800 feet up the ski slope, with a 600-foot vertical lift. One side of the double tow will operate as an express to the top, while the other side has an inter-

mediate point where skiers can get off to use easier slopes.

The Porcupine Mountains ski area has been described as "the best skiing spot in the midwest" and has grown in popularity since opening in 1950. Last year, more than 17,000 persons used the area—compared with only 7,000 visitors in 1953.

Much of the area's appeal is created by a long skiing season, usually from mid-December to mid-March.

The winter sports area is located 17 miles west of Ontonagon and 54 miles northeast of Ironwood. No overnight accommodations are available at

the park, but cabins may be obtained locally and at Ontonagon.

In addition to the new ski tow, rope tows also are in operation during the season. Daily rates for the tows have been set at \$2.50 for adults and \$1.00 for students. Season rates of \$25 for adults and \$15 for students also are available.

Other improvement work underway at the area includes enlarging of the warming shelter to add to kitchen facilities and the ski shop, where equipment can be rented.

Members of the State Legislature, Department of Conservation officials, representatives of the Michigan Farm Bureau, the Michigan State Grange and the Michigan Humane Society, will appear to discuss the MBHA recommendations. Committees will meet Friday evening with regular sessions commencing at 10 a.m., Saturday the 18th. The greatest big game dinner in America is the main attraction for the Saturday night banquet, when the delegates will be served a dinner that will include three bear taken by members during the season and 500 pounds of beaver.

Representative Arnell Engstrom and Lewis Zimmerman, Traverse City big game hunters, will show movies covering their recent "African Safari." Ray Voss, Outdoor Editor of the Grand Rapids Herald will be toastmaster. The Sparky-Hale Conservation Award will be presented to the outstanding conservationist of Michigan. The meetings are open to the general public, but due to lack of space, only male members are sold tickets to the annual banquet.
