L. Weldon Payne Elected President

To Preside at Jan. 15
Membership Meeting

L. Weldon Payne, newly elected president of M.L.C.A., will preside at the first membership meeting of the new year on Wednesday, January 15.

At the December 18 election meeting, Payne was chosen president by winning over Walt Peters by 16 votes.

Monty Wysong, 1957 board chairman, was selected as vice president, and Secretary Herb Harvey, Treasurer George Jaffray, and Membership-Secretary Marion Pullis were returned to office.

Board of directors members elected for three year terms were Harry Horner, Nick Lup, and Bruce Enfield. They will serve with Directors Clay Adams, E. P. Chaplow, Ray Gladstone, Harold Purdie and Arnold Rahn, who remain in office.

Past President Ray Chabot automatically becomes a director for one year.

Timber products from seven state forests—valued at \$18,733—will be offered for sale in the near future. The sales will allow timber cutters to harvest 4,524 cords of pulpwood, 419,000 board feet of sawlogs, 170 tons of chemical wood, 14,300 posts and 200 ties.
