January Board Meeting

Wed. Jan., 22, 1958

The meeting was called to order by Secretary Harvey at 8:25 p.m. with the following members absent: Chaplow.

The first order of business was the election of a chairman for the new year. Wysong was nominated. Lup moved nominations close, seconded by Payne. Motion carried.

There being two vacancies on the Board, caused by the election of Payne and Wysong, Lup moved we consider those other members on the ballot who were not elected, in filling these vacancies. Seconded by Payne, motion carried. Sutton and Ramsey were named to fill said vacancies.

The minutes of the December Board meeting were accepted as corrected.

The secretary read a communication from Al Meredith requesting our approval of the proposed legislation favoring the passage of a Great Lakes fishing license. Pullis moved the Board go on record as approving this proposal, and that the secretary notify Al Meredith of our approval. Seconded by Payne, motion carried.

Chabot moved that Adams be authorized to contact two

teachers in this district regarding their attendance at the Conservation Dept.'s training school for Outdoor Recreation. Seconded by Pullis, motion carried.

The Treasurer reported our books were in the hands of the auditors so his report would be delayed.

Mrs. Chabot and Mrs. Gronemeyer were present and asked for a date for the Ladies Bowling Dance. Chabot moved the date of February 8 be allocated to the Ladies Bowling League for a dance, under the usual conditions. Seconded by Pullis, motion carried.

Adams moved the Outdoor-ama report be accepted, and the committee discharged. Seconded by Lup, motion carried. Adams moved the Skeet and Trap, Fish committee, MUCC Annual Award committee reports be accepted by the treasurer, subject to the approval of the Auditing committee, in order to close out our books for the year. Seconded by Chabot, motion carried.

The treasurer read the bills payable. Chabot moved the claims be allowed, seconded by Horner. Motion carried.

The President had not appointed all his committees for the year but did present the names of Warren Pushaw for Food, Ted Czarnecki for Skeet and Trap and Floyd Cheek for Archery. This latter nomination was taken under advisement. Chabot moved the first two nominations be accepted. Seconded by Rahn, motion carried.

Warren Pushaw was present and asked for \$100.00 appropriation with which to purchase various staples needed by the Food committee. Adams moved the request be granted, seconded by Chabot. Motion carried.

Purdie moved the Building committee be instructed to build food storage cabinets in the storage room for the protection of needed supplies, in the immediate future. Seconded by Chabot, motion carried.

Ted Czarnecki was present and asked for an appropriation of \$500.00 with which to purchase inventory. Adams moved the request be granted, second-

ed by Enfield. Motion carried.

The President read a letter from Tom Crane, who wished all members and the club health and continued well being. Tom reported he and Howard Perkins were scheduled for a fishing trip the next day. Tom is receiving his Multi-Laker and enjoying it.

Purdie moved we advance \$100.00 to the Presidents' Banquet committee. Seconded by Horner, motion carried.

Adams asked for a \$50.00 appropriation for expenses for the Pot Luck supper on February 1. Pullis moved the request be granted, seconded by Enfield. Motion carried.

Pullis moved our Honorary membership for 1958 contain the names of Al Masini, Frank Irons, H. Johnson, and E. McQuern. Seconded by Lup, motion carried.

Horner moved we allocate \$1000.00 to the Retirement Fund. Seconded by Rahn, motion carried.

Permission was given the Deck committee to enlarge our dock space.

Archery was granted permission to repair our old lawn mower for their own use, at their own expense.

Chabot moved that a nice letter be written to all members who have not paid their dues by February 16, containing their addressograph plates, and informing them this would be the last mailing to them as a member of Multi-Lakes Conservation Association. If there should be extenuating circumstances, they must be presented before March 1. Seconded by Pullis, motion carried.

There was a lot more to talk about but the hour grew late, so the meeting adjourned. Time 12:25 a.m.

Wed., Jan. 15, 1958

The meeting was called to order by President Payne at 8:25 p.m. with the following officers present:

The members present stood and pledged allegiance to the Flag, and recited the Conservation Pledge.

The minutes of the December Membership meeting were accepted as printed in the Multi-Laker. The minutes of the December Board meeting were

read and accepted as read.

In the President's report, President Payne thanked the membership for placing him in office, and promised to do all in his power to keep Multi-Lakes on the high plane which it now occupies. He asked for all the help each individual member could give him, and urged one and all to get on a committee and work for the betterment of our club. Attendance at our functions was urged, and the President cited a turnout of only 39 persons at our last dance, and 37 blood donors when the Bloodmobile visited here on January 14, as a very poor attendance.

Nick Lup reporting on the Regional III Meeting in Lansing said an attendance of 150 representatives did a fine job of discussing the various proposals to be placed on our Legislative Agenda. Some very fine proposals were advanced. Nick read

an excerpt from the Readers Digest magazine about the beauties of nature.

Clayt Adams for the Pot Luck Dinner urged everyone to come out on Saturday, February 1 to honor those committeemen who had done an outstanding job in 1957.

Ted Czarnecki, new chairman for Skeet and Trap, announced there would be Shoots held on the last two Sundays of each month until further notice. At 2:00 p.m., gang, Come on out. We are going to win the MUCC State Shoot this year.

Warren Neuenschwander, Water Resources, reported not much activity in pollution as of now. He was highly pleased at the attendance at the Regional III meeting in Lansing, with 253 of 284 clubs in the Region being represented. Some very sensible proposals were advanced for the MUCC Convention agenda. Warren also reported he had been appointed to the Nation Water Resources Council.

The Plastic Age

The Plastic Age is aiding sportsmen in a new way. Polyethylene bags have been used with excellent success to transport young fish from hatcheries to streams.

The fish are placed in bags partly filled with water; these are set in cardboard boxes, and the bags then filled with oxygen.

In one experiment, Ohio conservation officials shipped 369 pike fry in these cheap, convenient boxes. The trip took nearly 30 hours and only three fry died.

More than 18,000,000 trees from state-owned nurseries were planted this year on public and private land.
