## Deer Kill Tops Any Season Since 1953

An estimated 92,500 deer were taken in Michigan during the 1958 season, according to the conservation department.

This is a high mark since the 1953 harvest of 99,500 and confirms a department preseason forecast of a 10-15 percent increase over last year's take of 79,435 whitetails.

The Mackinac Bridge Authority reported approximately 13,000 deer were taken out of the Upper Peninsula, compared with 9,220 last year. Larger areas and quotas for antlerless deer accounted for the difference above the Straits. Apparently there was no significant change in the Upper Peninsula buck kill but the antlerless kill was probably close to the UP quota of 7,000.

In the Lower Peninsula, where there was no funnel such as that provided by the Big Mac for counting deer, accurate figures were hard to come by, but department statisticians said: "so far as we know now, the buck kill is definitely up over last year."

H. D. Ruhl, chief of the department's game division, indicated it is too early to estimate total kill figures for ant-

lerless deer. Postcards were mailed Dec. 2 to all hunters and until returns are in, no accurate information will be available. Chances are the antlerless kill in the Lower Peninsula exceeded expectations of 15,200 but he could not say by how much.

Lower Peninsula deer seemed to be in better physical condition this year. Antler measurements and average weights on 1½-year-old bucks are significantly up over last year according to department check point figures. This was not true of deer taken in the Upper Peninsula, however. There was little change there; if anything, the general physical condition was "down a little."

Numbers of hunters were undoubtedly above last year's total of 419,300. Highway department traffic counters in the Lower Peninsula showed a four percent increase and hunter traffic at the Mackinac Bridge was up 10 percent over 1957.

## Deer Racks Wanted by Game Division

Members of the Conservation Department's game division are head-hunting, so to speak. Above-average Michigan deer racks are the objects of this search.

The largest recorded Michigan antlers rank no better than 88th among comparative entries, according to the 1958 Records of North American Big Game publication.

Game division members are firmly convinced that larger, unrecorded specimens exist. To support this theory and enhance Michigan's national ranking, they are soliciting the sportsman's cooperation.

If your trophy meets minimum requirements of a 10-point rack and an inside spread of 20 inches, please contact the Department's game division, Mason Building, Lansing 26, Michigan.

# Year-End Review of Conservation Work

(Here is a brief summary of some of the highlights in conservation activities in Michigan for the year 1958.)

Michigan's 59 state parks and recreation areas received top billing in conservation activities during 1958. General attendance approached the 18,000,000 record mark of 1955 and camp permits soared to an all-time high of 134,500; a 16 per cent jump over last year.

The widely publicized issue to lease or not to lease a portion of the Porcupine Mountains state park to a copper mining company -- neared a final decision by the Conservation Commission as 1959 approached.

Michigan's hunting and fish-

ing popularity reasserted itself as some 2,461,800 hunters and anglers enjoyed the state's woods, fields and waters.

Approximately 1,257,000 hunting licenses were sold while fishing license purchases totaled 1,204,800.

Deer hunters, estimated at more than 400,000, experienced their most successful year since 1953, harvesting 92,500 white-tails. They were aided by a game management program which established "any deer" seasons -- concurrent with the regular 15-day period in 37 designated food-shortage and crop-damage areas.

From all indications, more than 1,000,000 ringneck pheasants were bagged for the sixth consecutive year; a figure 10-15 percent below the pre-season estimate. Grouse population dipped slightly and the kill totals dropped from 350,000 in 1957 to an estimated 325,000 this year. According to early reports, rabbit hunting success promises to be good.

Another outlet was opened to hunters when the Legislature passed a bill establishing a shooting preserve program. The Department, hunters and prospective preserve owners are keeping a close eye on results from 35 public and private areas now in operation.

Good trapping weather and increased bag limits produced a record beaver and otter harvest.

Some 4,775,730 fish -- including 2,470,317 trout -- were planted in

Michigan's public waters. The plantings considerably exceeded the 1957 restocking figure of 3,166,000.

Twenty-four public fishing sites were acquired boosting the state's total to 720.

In a program designed to aid the return of lake trout to the Great Lakes, nearly 1,000,000 eggs were taken from selected inland lakes for hatchery rearing.

The Department's program for chemical treatment of lakes to improve fishing was accelerated during the year with rewarding results in 24 lakes treated.

There also were new hopes this year that eventually the sea lamprey may be brought under control in the Great Lakes. Intensive chemical treatment of 30 river and stream spawning waters was encouraging. These tests were performed by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service with Conservation Department cooperation.

State forest timber sales receipts dropped from a record \$795,000 in 1957 to \$709,761 for the 1958 fiscal year ending June 30.

## New Browse Cutter Helps Feed Deer

A new impetus may have been injected into Michigan's deer-food management program when Conservation Department workers began testing a rapid timber-cutting contrivance, recently, on state forests in a northeast sector of Gladwin county.

The device—a heavy, crawler-type tractor employing an 11-foot cutting blade—is expected to level an average of two acres per hour.

Approximately 210 acres were selected for the cuttings which are concentrated as aspen stands of non-merchantable quality in eight or nine poor winter-browse ranges. The experiment, expected to last 30 days, will furnish a browse supply this winter for the ranges' deer herd.


The cuttings are expected to

stimulate prolific aspen sprout growth which will improve the post-winter food supply. Ruffed grouse, rabbits and other game will also benefit as cover and vegetation will be regenerated in the cut-over areas.

Cuttings are being made in long, narrow and irregular

strips to provide "forest edges", conducive to growth of close-to-ground food plants. Dog-leg cutting patterns are designed to reduce the possibility of hunters walking into the firing line of others.

If the new tool proves to be economically feasible, the operation will be extended to other anaemic winter-browse areas.

## Farmers Approve Courteous Hunters

Courtesy is still the keynote, and a recent survey of farmer-sportsman relations backs up the old advice, "if you want to hunt, ask the farmer first."

The survey, run during the first week of pheasant season showed that when southern Michigan farmers are politely asked, four out of five are hospitable enough to allow complete strangers to hunt on their land.

But hunters who damage or trespass on farm property only hurt their reputation and future chances for hunting. The recurring complaint of farmers who refused permission was that previous hunters had trespassed or caused damage. On this basis, these farmers wanted no further contact with "outdoorsmen."

Many farmers, on the other hand, were gracious enough to permit hunting, even after expressing criticism of past misconduct by hunters.

The survey involved 300 southern Michigan farms. Eighteen two-man crews, mostly Conservation Department employes, went to the statistically selected "sample" farms and asked if they might hunt. They also asked landowners if they had experienced trespass or damage and found that most had.

One out of five farms in the survey was posted. However, some farmers who posted their lands allowed hunting and some who had not, did not allow hunting.

# Pan Fish Favorites of Ice Fishermen

Ice fishing has now joined Michigan's wide-ranged list of winter outdoor activities.

Panfish — particularly bluegills and perch—are among the favorite catches of ice fishermen, with no closed season on non-trout waters throughout the state.

Other species open to year-round fishing on non-trout waters include white bass, sunfish, crappie, rock bass, war-mouth bass and whitefish.

Anglers also may take muskellunge, northern pike and walleyed pike on all non-trout inland waters through March 15. Seasons on these species vary somewhat in the Great Lakes and connecting waters.

Spearing through the ice also is popular with fishermen, especially during the February sturgeon season on non-trout inland waters.

Spearing is permitted during

January and February on inland non-trout waters — and some designated trout waters—for carp, suckers, mullet, redhorse, sheepshead, lake trout, smelt northern pike muskellunge white fish, ciscoes, pilotfish or Menominee whitefish, catfish, bullheads, dogfish and garpike.

Ice fishermen are reminded that all shanties must be identified on the outside with the owner's name and address in at least two-inch letters of insoluble material. All shelters must be removed before ice becomes unsafe.

As a safety precaution, fishermen are advised:

Beware of thin ice near shoreline, where rapid and strong undertows make ice hazardous.

Beware of discolored ice. This is a sign that ice is weakened and dangerous.

**Withdraws Petition to Mine Porcupine**

Bear Creek Mining Co. has withdrawn its application for a copper mine in Michigan's Porcupine Mountains State Park.

The company's action came four days before the State Con-

servation Commission was to vote on the issue.

The commission was expected to turn down the application.

In a letter to conservation director Gerald E. Eddy, Bear Creek President C. H. Burgess

indicated the company's action was prompted by the storm of opposition its application stirred up among Michigan's conservation-minded citizens.

"We have become increasingly aware of the several conflicting and seemingly irreconcilable viewpoints of the people in the area and in the state as to the most desirable future course for the development and utilization of natural resources in the park", Burgess said.

Bear Creek is a subsidiary of Kennecott Copper Co. It sought to explore and mine 5,200 acres of the Nene Suth lode under Lake Superior.

To do so, it had to have 933 acres of the Porcupine Park for a base.

Burgess pointed out that Eddy last month announced he would recommend that the Conservation Commission reject the mine lease.

The Porcupine Mountains is the state's largest park—57,943 acres. It is one of the nation's last wilderness areas.

Nature lovers in Michigan and other states have campaigned against the mine lease since the Bear Creek application was filed in September, 1957.
