# ★ The President's Column ★

The Nominating Committee will have wound up its difficult job of selecting a slate of candidates for our 1960 election of officers and directors to be held at the Annual Meeting on December 16th. Stan Tusan and his committee of over 20 members have had many meetings and worked hard to complete their list of candidates which will be presented to the membership at the October meeting.

Keep in mind that you have the privilege of making nominations from the floor at the November meeting - however, the member so nominated from the floor must have:

1. Been a member for 3 years.
2. Agreed to accept nomination.
3. Filled out the necessary Nominee Form which can be obtained at the Club House.

The Annual M.U.C.C. State Skeet, Trap and Archery Shoot was held on September 13th at the Detroit Sportsmen's Congress Club Grounds and was a big day in every way for the teams and their families who traveled from all parts of the State to compete. Our Multi-Lakes teams didn't take any top honors, but our hats are off to them for coming early and staying late to take their turn

at both skeet and trap.

The Multi-Lakes membership got solidly behind Arnold Larges at the September meeting and unanimously directed the Board of Directors to make every effort to secure the 1960 Michigan United Conservation Clubs State Skeet, Trap and Archery Shoot. If our bid is successful, this big shoot will be held on our grounds on a Sunday in September of 1960.

As your president, I am writing a letter to John O'Donnell, Chairman of the State Shoot Committee. (He is also president of Detroit Sportsmen's Congress) requesting the 1960 Shoot be awarded to Multi-Lakes Conservation Association. The MUCC Board of Directors at its meeting in Elk Rapids on October 17 and 18 will decide which club will be awarded the 1960 shoot and I plan to be on hand and speak on behalf of Multi-Lakes' bid.

If Multi-Lakes is awarded this big annual affair, it will mean a tremendous amount of work for a lot of members. It will not only be a big day for the committee handling the shoot but also the Archery Committee, and the Food Committee which will have to feed people who will be spending the entire day with us. Outdoor refreshment tents will have to be manned and a communications system and parking will be major jobs.

Make up your mind now that you are going to help if we are successful in our bid.

Don't forget -- the October membership meeting is on the second Wednesday (October 14) and the November meeting is also on the second Wednesday (November 11). Both meetings were moved up because of conflict with hunting seasons.

# September Board Meeting

Wednesday, Sept. 23, 1959

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Monty Wysong at 8:05 p.m. Those present were:

Harry Helvey, Arnold Rahn, Harold Purdie, Everett Ramsey, Jack Allan, Weldon Payne, Ray Chabot, Monty Wysong, Ralph Richardson, Nick Lup, and Bruce Enfield. Clayton Adams and Harry Horner were excused.

Minutes of the August 26 Board meeting were read by Payne to aid the new recording secretary. They had been approved at the regular Membership meeting.

Roy Stiles, chairman of the annual picnic, reported a profit of \$317.10. This included sale of T shirts and misc. He stated that he was short about \$5.00 but had made it up out of his own pocket. The Board felt it should come out of the profits. Motion made by Chabot that report be accepted, seconded by Enfield, passed.

A report on child delinquency was given by George Woodward, M.L.C.A. member who is on the board of directors of the Walled Lake Beavers Little League football team. This is a project known as Beaver Booster program. He was trying to raise money to purchase football uniforms and equipment for about 100 boys, age 9 to 12 years, at a cost of about \$30.00 per boy. The mother league is known as "All American Football League" run by Joe Gembis of Detroit. Nick Lup was reluctant to the idea of donating to outside organizations not tied in with conservation. Harry Helvey brought up M.L.C.A.'s donation to the Walled Lake Consolidated School's Proud Lake Recreation program. Lup felt we should sponsor a team rather than support an outside interest which he felt was against club policies.

Purdie offered congratulations to George Woodward on his efforts toward child welfare and assured him the Board would take some type of action later in the evening. This was done when Ray Chabot made a motion that M.L.C.A. donate \$50.00 to the Walled Lake Little League Football team, seconded by Enfield, passed. Also that no soliciting be allowed at clubhouse during Membership meetings.

John Esler, chairman of the Food committee, requested \$100.00 to operate the kitchen. Helvey moved we give him the money. Nick Lup seconded, passed. Lup also suggested that Committee chairmen make monthly statements to the Board.

C. Earl Sutter, member of M.L.C.A. reported on what had happened recently on the Skeet range. This particular Sunday he felt he was badly dealt with by Ted Czarnecki who was in charge of the range. This member stated that he was cussed at and told to get out and stay out. He said that he and his two boys had spent as much as \$27.00 on a recent Sunday at the range. He also stated that the range opened anywhere from 10:00 to 2:00 p.m. On the day in question it

opened about 12:00 noon. In the discussion Mr. Sutton offered his time to aid committee. Weldon Payne is to check with Ted Czarnecki on this incident to get full details and report back to the Board.

Arnold Larges wants M.L.C.A. to get the 1960 MUCC Skeet, Trap and Archery Shoot if possible. He stated that he would take chairmanship of such a program.

Purdie didn't think we should get the 1960 shoot but to aim towards the 1961 event. Lup suggested that we make every effort to get the 1960 shoot, and Payne felt we had a good chance of getting it.

Discussion came up as to what M.L.C.A. had to do to get 1960 shoot and how much preparation would be required, including the money to promote the program. Maximum cost of approximately \$3000.00 was estimated by Larges, with minimum of \$1500.00.

Requirements would include four trap ranges, two skeet ranges, lots of bulldozing, and the possibility of renting portable range houses.

Motion made by Ramsey that Payne make formal application to get the 1960 MUCC shoot, seconded by Helvey, passed 8 to 1.

Treasurer Harry Helvey, as requested by the Board at previous meeting, reported on club insurance carried with Voorheis and Cox regarding M.L.C.A. employees. He stated that the insurance covers any person working at least one hour who is being paid by M.L.C.A.

Helvey recommended the fol-

President's report by Payne stated that he had sent a telegram to Harry Gaines from M. L.C.A. in respect on a recent Harry Gaines Day. Gaines, who is now 67 years old and will retire soon, has been active for many years in MUCC.

Payne also reported that the Dist. 7 meeting of MUCC will be held at the Genesee County Sportsmen's Club Friday night November 25, 1959. Members planning to attend are Payne, Ramsey, Larsen and Helvey.

Payne also stated that arrangements have been made for paying off the Star MUCC Award salesmen who sold tickets and are entitled to steak dinners.

Enfield questioned as to why temporary secretary doesn't get paid \$15.00 per month same as regular elected secretary. Also discussion was held on proper procedure to fill vacancy of recording secretary office. The procedure being followed at present is to try out several members to find out who is capable of doing good job, making them eligible for permanent secretary's job when next election is held.

made report on television service program by RCA. They offer yearly service program but found their service so bad that another repair man was contacted and repairs were made satisfactorily. Enfield moved that the RCA program not be considered, but that repairs be made as needed. Seconded by Chabot, passed.

Purdie also reported that a steam table for the kitchen had been ordered. It is a Thermolux table, complete for approximately \$500.00, and fits in with our other kitchen equipment. Board asked that he push the company in order to have table for Hunters' Brawl.

His report on enclosure for Bar and Kitchen openings was as follows: Wolverine Door could furnish steel shutters, two only, 12'4 x 4'-0" rolls for \$833.00. The same, for \$133.00 extra, with an alum. lite finish; Wood doors, same size, in fir \$765.00; in birch, \$113.00 extra; Kennebec Mfg. Co., two steel rolling shutters, \$545.00 material only, \$210.00 to install, \$300.00 extra for stainless steel.

Helvey made motion that up to \$1000.00 be allowed for purchase and installation of rolling counter shutters, seconded by Chabot, passed.

Purdie was also to get price on material and labor to install same to finish off barroom with same type paneling as is now on archway. He is also to reinvestigate fresh air makeup subject, and to get prices to paint ballroom. It was Purdie's impression that something must be done about toilets, possibly the trouble being the water pressure. He reported that he would report back to Board on same.

Everett Ramsey is to get price on Directory bulletin board and purchase same.



The President asked if there were any questions regarding the Treasurer's report, and it was moved by Devore and seconded by Beguhn, that the Treasurer's report be accepted as printed in the Multi-Laker. Carried.

In his opening remarks the President thanked everyone who brought their old papers out for the Boy Scouts. They had already collected one truck load and were well on their way with another. ## Ten Commandments Of Safety

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of gun safety.
2. Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded, and taken down or have ac-

tions open; guns always should be carried in cases to the shooting area.

3. Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from chamber before firing.
4. Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle even if you stumble; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.

5. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.

6. Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while handling a gun.
7. Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.

8. Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.

9. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice, be sure your backstop is adequate.
10. Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

# Duck Shooting

The duck hunter's most important piece of equipment is his gun. Important as it is, it is of little good unless the shooter has had plenty of practice with the gun. Most waterfowlers never get a chance to shoot more than 50 rounds in the course of a single duck season, and that is not enough shooting to get really good.

A 12-gauge pump or automatic shotgun with a 30-inch barrel is probably the best all-around duck gun. Experts suggest starting with a modified choke and then going to a full choke after you have become more proficient. They recommend using No. 6 shot for early-season birds and changing to No. 4s late in the season when birds are more heavily feathered. Three-inch Magnum shells with No. 4 shot are ideal for pass-shooting at any time.

The best way for a duck hunter to get tuned up for his sea-

son's shooting is with trap and skeet. Practice at these sports during the summer months will pay big dividends in the duck blind.

The sport of waterfowling can be expensive. It is a good idea to work out a partnership with a hunting companion for equipment other than guns and ammunition. Boats, decoys and motors are easily shared.

The proper lead in duck shooting is the greatest single thing to learn to have successful days afield. Without question the most ducks are missed or crippled because of the gunner not leading enough. Many hunters learn this lesson when they shoot for the bird at the head of a column and the last bird in the line falls from their fire. In leading, the important thing to remember is not only to lead enough but to keep swinging the gun forward while pressing the trigger. Often a gunner leads all right but then brings his gun to a pause for a moment before he fires—and the game is gone.

There are no hard-and-fast rules for leading ducks. Every situation is a little different, so you have to develop the right lead from experience. In general, you can almost always figure that the birds are traveling faster than you might first think. If a duck is coming straight for you, take aim at the tip of his bill and hold it there as you pull the trigger. If the duck is flying away from you, bear in mind that he is gaining altitude as fast as possible as well as putting distance between you as quickly as he can. Shoot six inches to a foot above him. If it is a long shot, even high-

er will be better.

When you are shooting at ducks that are flying horizontally past your blind and there is no strong wind, five to ten feet lead is right for average conditions.

The right clothes are particularly important in waterfowling. Be prepared for any kind of weather—You usually get it during duck season. Woolen underwear is a must in the North. A rubber parka will not only serve you in the rain but be useful as a windbreaker. A turtle-neck sweater will be more comfortable and keep you warmer than a harsh wool shirt. Wool mittens are more practical than gloves—you can get your shooting hand out more quickly. Waders are an item you will almost always wish you had brought along if you didn't. Remember, too, that all your duck-hunting clothes should blend with the color of the spot you are hunting.

One of the big secrets of successful duck hunters is to be well concealed. Take the time to get the proper blind setup.

## Shooting Preserves Are Open to Hunters

Featuring liberalized regulations, shooting preserves opened September 15 in Michigan for pheasant and duck hunting. Some preserves will also offer hunting for chukar partridges, coturnix quail and other exotics.

Together with the later closing date of March 31, this fall's advanced opening will give pheasant and duck hunters 47 more days of preserve shooting than last year.

In 1958, the preserve season on pheasants opened concurrently with small game seasons while ducks became legal preserve targets October 1 in both peninsulas. Hunting was closed to both birds March 15.

A 10-percent increase in the graduated allowable take of preserve pheasants will also be in effect this fall. The higher kill quota, coupled with a longer season, is expected to lower shooting fees.

Another change will allow hunters to shoot preserve ducks within 40 yards of lakes, streams and ponds. However, hunters may not shoot toward these waters within an 80-yard zone. The 40-yard restriction will enable operators to set blinds in more suitable areas.

Last year's restriction against any artificial feeding on pre-

serves from January 1 to March 15 has been liberalized. The new rule allows the Conservation Department to determine where such feeding will be permitted.

In a minor change, the placement of seals on birds has been shifted from the wing to the leg.

The Department has issued licenses to seven new operators this year, raising the number of preserves to 40. There were 34 preserves open to shooting during the program's debut in Michigan last year.

## Brook Trout, Rainbow Still Legal in Spots

Fishermen are reminded that September 13 was the final day of Michigan's 1959 regular trout season. This date also marked an end to all fishing in designated trout lakes and most trout streams.

Some trout streams or portions of these streams remain open to fishing for other species after the regular trout season closes.

Brook trout will remain on the legal catch list through October 15 in Swanzy and Airport lakes of Marquette county. This experimental regulation is part of a Conservation Department research project.

Rainbow trout may also be taken during an extended fall season—September 15-November 30—in lakes and streams designated by the Department.

A listing of lakes and streams open to hook and line fishing during this season can be obtained from the Department's fish division, Lansing 26, or any of the Department's district field headquarters.

## Seeks Grouse Hunters For High Island Tests

Conservation Department game men are looking for hunters to harvest an expanding grouse population on High Island, a part of the Little Beaver Island state game area, during this fall's small game season.

The experimental hunt will be held on this isolated 3,500-acre island to determine the most practical length for open grouse seasons on the mainland. Approximately 100 hunters will be needed to help reach the Department's harvest goal of 40-50 percent of the island's birds.

Since 1956 when the Department introduced 35 birds there, the grouse population has flourished and now approximates 300 birds. Previously, no hunting has been permitted on the island.

Modest camping facilities have been arranged and the Department will provide some transportation on the island. Although the island's terrain is rugged, trails have been well marked to avoid the danger of hunters becoming lost.

Transportation arrangements to the island may be made by contacting the Beaver Island Civic Association. Ferry service to Beaver Island is available from Charlevoix. Those desiring to take their cars to Beaver Island must make reservations to Charlevoix.

Persons participating in the hunt are requested to notify the Department's fire officer on Beaver Island.

# Sets Regulations for 1959-1960 Fishing

Regulations governing Michigan's 1959-60 fishing seasons were set during the Conservation Commission's September meeting at the Higgins Lake conservation school.

Davis and Cedar lakes of Leelanau county and Squaw lake of Marquette county were added to the Commission's listing of designated trout lakes. Dropped from the 1958-59 roster were: Stager pond, Iron county; Harper, Rainbow, Reed, and Sand lakes, Lake county; Sand lake, Manistee county; Half Moon lake, Muskegon county; and Sunrise lake, Osceola county.

\* \* \*

A five-year order was approved, effective January 1, 1960, barring the use or possession of spears for fishing during April on or along the shores of certain waters in Alpena, Montmorency and Presque Isle counties.

The same restriction on spearing will be imposed for three years, starting January 1, 1960, on or along inland waters of Gladwin county from April 1 through April 14. Purpose of the

measure is to match the spearing season for noxious fish more closely with fish migrations.

\* \* \*

A score of other waters will be covered by the spearing restriction during January and February in an effort to raise northern pike and muskellunge populations to an even level with panfish.

With slight modifications, the Commission renewed a five-year order which prohibits fishing in a section of Black river, Cheboygan county, from the last Saturday in April through May 31.

A two-year order was renewed, effective December 1, 1959, which will make it unlawful to take or possess more than 10 ciscoes per day from South Manistique lake, Mackinac county.

\* \* \*

In a stepped-up effort to eliminate large numbers of stunted perch in Houghton lake, Roscommon county, fishermen will be permitted to take an unlimited number of these fish by hook and line during the entire year, beginning January 1, 1960.

Protection will be continued for northern pike populations in Lower Scott lake, Allegan county, and Turk and Townline lakes.

Commissioners approved minor changes in reciprocal regulations controlling fishing in inland waters which form a common boundary between Michigan and Wisconsin.

# Warns Hunters Not to Cheat on Deer Permits

Deer hunters are warned by the Conservation Department that it doesn't pay to submit more than one application for special season permits.

This year's improved checking system will enable Department personnel to keep a close tab on all applications. Persons who break the one-application rule will be subject to fines and costs. In some cases, violators may also lose their hunting privileges.

Approximately 540 duplications were discovered in permit applications for the 1958 seasons. Some 271 persons were assessed fines and costs totaling more than \$5,000. Action is still pending on 18 cases.

# October Unlocks Gates for Hunters In Michigan Areas

State hunters went into action October 1 in northern Michigan with the opening of firearm seasons on small game and bear and archery seasons on bear and deer. In the southern lower peninsula the archery bear season also opened October 1.

Last year's bag limits and season lengths will continue on ruffed grouse, pheasant, raccoon, rabbit, squirrel and woodchuck hunting. Pheasants will not be legal targets in the northern lower peninsula until October 20 when small game seasons will be open statewide. Fox squirrels will again be protected in the upper peninsula.

For the first time in the State's hunting history, Hungarian partridges will be fair game under a short experimental season. "Hunkies" may be hunted October 12-15 in Chip-

pewa county only. Bag limits will be two per day, four in possession and eight per season.

Woodchuck hunting seasons will run October 1-November 9 in the upper and northern lower peninsulas and October 20-November 9 in the southern lower peninsula. These cork-screw acrobats will be the first migratory game birds open to hunting in northern Michigan. Seasons on other migratory game birds, including waterfowl, begin at noon, Oct. 7.

Bears may be hunted with dogs October 1-November 5 above the Straits, October 1-15 in the northern lower peninsula and October 7-15 in the southern lower peninsula under small game licenses and special \$2.00 bear stamps.

Archers may hunt bears throughout the state October 1-November 5 under bow and arrow deer hunting licenses. Special bear stamps will not be required. Dogs are not permitted.

Archery deer seasons will run through November 5 in northern Michigan and December 15 in Allegan county. Archers may take only bucks with at least three-inch antlers in Emmet, Menominee and Chippewa counties — with the exception of Drummond Island.

Elsewhere, including Drummond Island, deer of either sex

or any age may be taken by bow and arrow hunters.

Additional hunting information is included in the 1959 Michigan Game Law Digest which is available at license dealers and district field headquarters of the Conservation Department.
