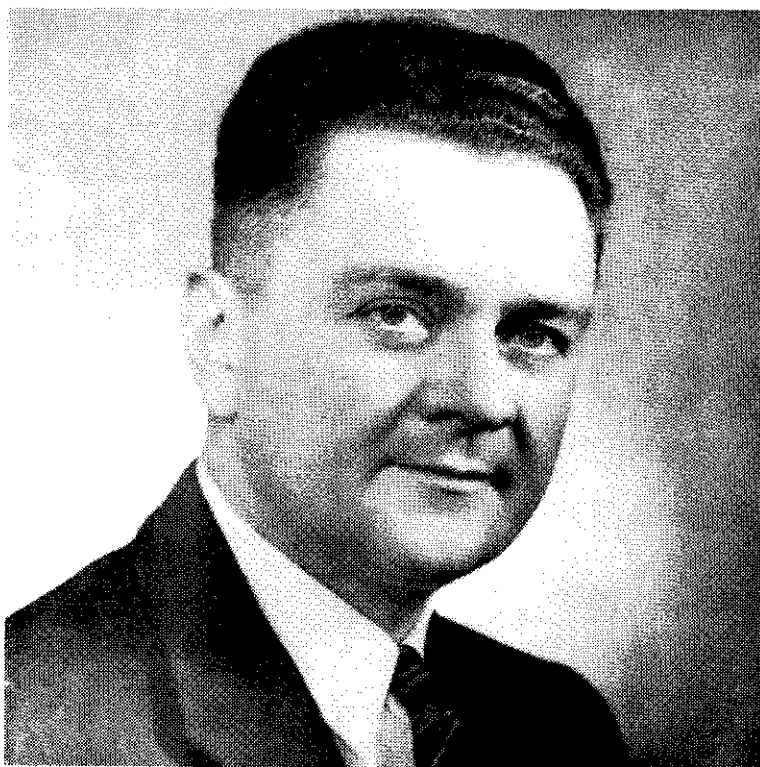

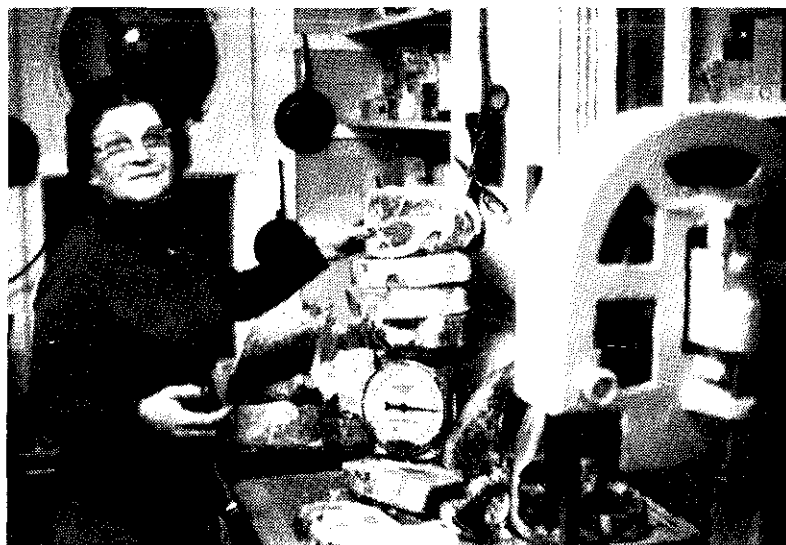

# ★ The President's Column ★

The March 1st deadline for dues payment has just passed, and it is gratifying to know we will have one of our lowest annual turn-overs in membership. There will probably not be more than 50 to 60 members taken in next month, and the waiting list is still staggering.

When we look around at our large metropolitan sportsmens clubs whose memberships have dropped alarmingly during 1958, it brings home to us the undeniable fact that our closed membership of 800 has helped to make our individual membership something to be treasured. Of course, that's only part of the story. With a closed membership we have been fortunate to enjoy a greater membership activity in club functions than an open membership could possibly hope for. These close-functioning activities have permitted Multi-Lakes to operate like a tightly-knit family—one for all—money has come in—facilities have been provided—so that in March of 1959 as we look back over 1958, your club has no debts—its members have every facility they or their families could want—94% of our 1958 members are back in the fold, and your hard-working Membership Committee is doing about its job of screening applicants to fill up the open spots—screening, so that as far as we can determine, our members will be active and not just card carriers.

As a member of Multi-Lakes for nearly 15 years and having always lived in Detroit, I feel I

should touch on an important decision that we hope will affect the destiny of our club to the benefit of all of us. It's no secret that Multi-Lakes is no longer 'Way Out in the Country' like it was when I joined in 1944. It won't be long before our 60 acres will be surrounded by real estate development. Some of us may live long enough to see it in the center of a city.

For many years a matter of growing concern has been the lack of participation in club functions by those who live from 20 to 30 miles from the club property. It is true that many of these are active, but percentage-wise they are few. Members who live within 10 miles of the club, are, on the average, more active. But are NOT better sportsmen, NOT better members of Multi-Lakes—its just a simple fact of geography.

For this reason your Board of Directors accepted unanimously the proposal that 60% of all new members accepted into Multi-Lakes Conservation Association, hereafter, must live within a 10 mile radius of the Club House.

As one who lives in Detroit I assure you there is no discrimination in this decision—only the desire to build a stronger Multi-Lakes. Of course, this in no way affects any present members and certainly will not bar any one living 25 or even 50 miles away if he is the type of membership prospect we are looking for.

Remember this is your Club—you have elected officers and a Board of Directors who are working hard to keep it the number one organization of its kind. We need your help—your criticism—your suggestions—Write, telephone or bring them up at meetings. How about helping make our jobs a little easier for us.

A second notice sent out to those clubs not responding to the first questionnaire produced an additional 40 clubs. Answers to the questionnaires are still coming in.

Of the 131 clubs reporting, the results to date are:

53% Yes, 47% No
- Repeal bounty on Coyote  
56% Yes, 44% No
- Repeal bounty on Wolf  
59% Yes, 41% No
- Repeal bounty on Bobcat  
59% Yes, 41% No

Adams moved that a board be made showing the names of chairmen and co-chairmen of all committees, same to be displayed on a wall in the clubhouse. Seconded by Chabot, motion carried. Adams, Ramsey and Chabot were appointed as a committee to construct the board.

Rahn brought up the Blood Bank. He needs help on recruiting donors. The matter of food for the Blood Bank was brought up. Enfield moved we give the Blood Bank committee permission to furnish food for the Red Cross workers. Seconded by Adams, motion carried.

Wm. King asked for a \$200.00 advance with which to purchase door prizes for the Fish Fry. Payne moved the advance be allowed, seconded by Helvey. Motion carried.

Lin Bush made an offer of \$55.00 for the club automatic which is not being used. Chabot moved we accept the offer, seconded by Payne. Motion carried.

No final decision had been made on the walk-in cooler, by the committee. This matter to

be taken up at a future meeting.

Enfield moved that the auditing of the bar account be turned over to the firm of Lohft & Noble, our regular auditors. Seconded by Chabot, motion carried.

The matter of a group insurance program for club members was brought up. Rahn was instructed to find out more about the matter.

Harvey moved we allow up to \$50.00 for repairs on the club TV set, seconded by Chabot. Motion carried.

The air conditioning matter was put off until a further meeting.

Chabot moved we adjourn. Enfield seconded the motion, same carried. Time: 11:05 p.m.

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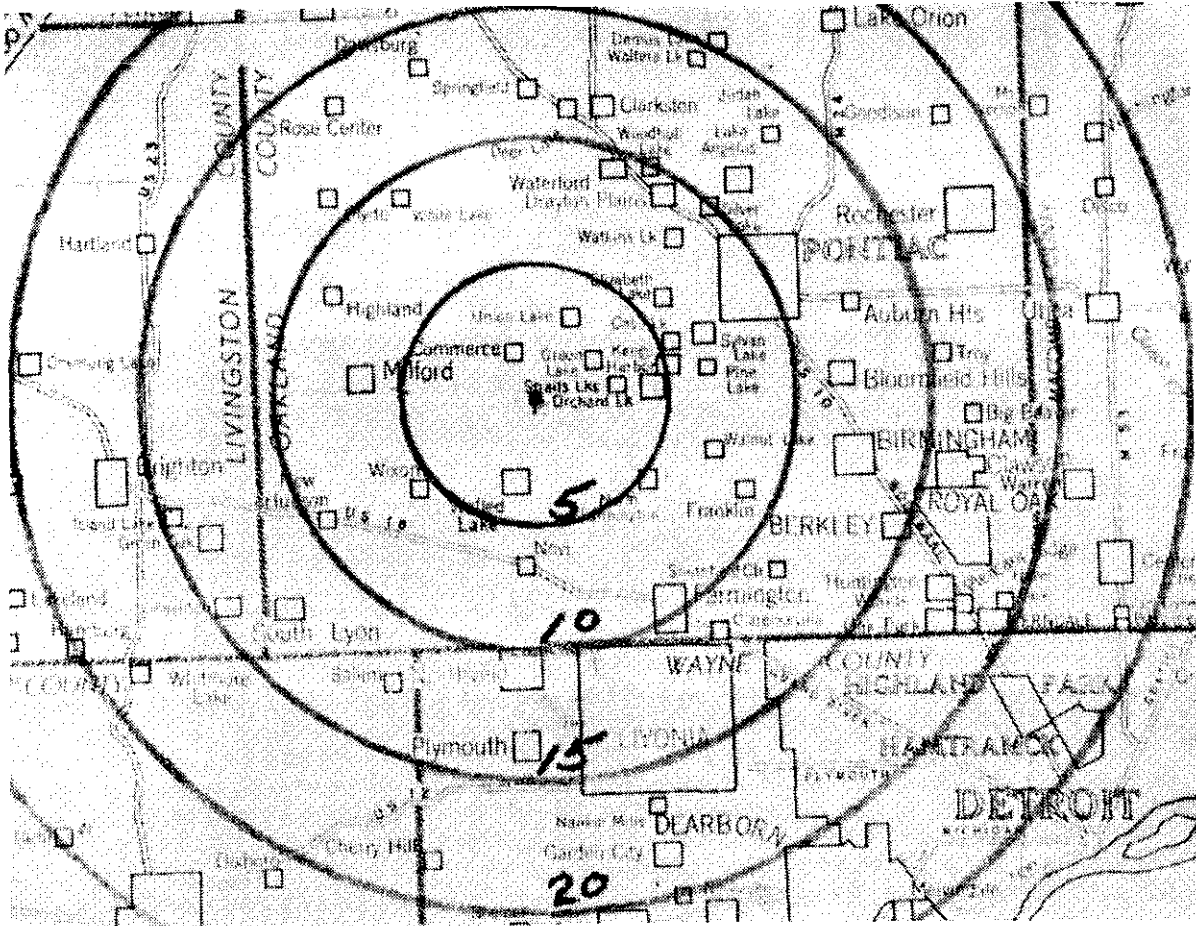

## Special Board Meeting

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Wysong at 8:25 p.m. with the following members absent: Horner, Lup, Richardson. Horner and Richardson had presented excuses, which were accepted by the Board.

The purpose of the meeting was discussion of methods of handling membership applications, the auditing situation, and discussion of the OUTDOOR-AMA report.

After considerable discussion, Purdie moved we allocate 60% of new membership to a ten mile radius of the club, seconded by Allan, motion carried.

The auditor question was then brought up, and a letter from Mr. Noble of Lohft and Noble was read, explaining services which they proposed to offer M.L.C.A. Purdie seconded the motion, and it carried.

The OUTDOORAMA report was opened for discussion. Day Perry, Chairman of the 1958 OUTDOORAMA, and John Zepf,

treasurer of the event, had already gone over the report with Warren Pushaw who had been puzzled about the food concession part of the report. Warren was now fully satisfied so the discussion ended on a happy note.

The chairman appointed E. Ramsey, H. Purdie, and W. Payne as a committee to formulate a letter, explaining the 60% allocation of membership to one and all.

Purdie moved we adjourn, seconded by Chabot. Motion carried. Time 10:30 p.m.

## An Open Letter to All Members

A proposal to select at least 60% of all new members of Multi-Lakes Conservation Association from within a radius of 10 miles of the Club House, was adopted by the Board of Directors and approved by the Membership Committee.

The reasoning behind this proposal was to maintain a more active membership.

Our club is faced with the problem of too few active members. We have a fine organization with from 150 to 200 of our 800 total membership who are active. Greater participation in the various activities of the club has become a necessity.

The greater proportion of our members who live a considerable distance from the Club are merely "Card Carriers", due to their location; however, some do participate actively in most of our Club functions. The greater percentage of activity comes from members who live close to the club property and avail themselves of its facilities.

This in no way affects present members, and is not meant to be discriminatory, but the population growth of the metropolitan area is rapidly moving into Suburbia.

An ACTIVE member, wherever he lives, is always a welcome asset to Multi-Lakes. Therefore it was the opinion of the Board that this method of selection of new members would be more beneficial to the future success of Multi-Lakes Conservation Association.

Biologists of the University of Idaho and the Idaho Fish and Game Department have completed a five-year study which indicates the noisy magpie is being maligned for game bird predation. The study team found only 1.4 per cent of the magpies examined had eaten pheasant eggs during nesting seasons. The predation occurred principally in nests located in poor cover, indication of another reason for the need of better habitat.

## Ground-Water Report Released to Public

The Conservation Department announces release of "Summary of Ground-Water Conditions in Michigan, 1957"—a report published for the purpose of evaluating ground-water supplies, to help predict water level trends and provide information for basic research.

It consists of 79 pages and graphically illustrates water level changes in observation wells throughout the state and the effects of precipitation, temperatures, municipal pumping, evaporation and earthquakes on water levels.

Copies of the report — cooperatively prepared by the Department's geological survey division and U. S. Geological Survey — are now available at public libraries and can be purchased for 25 cents from the Michigan Department of Conservation, Lansing 26.

## Shooting Preserves Facing Bleak Season

Prospects of a profitable season are rather bleak for operators of 34 shooting preserves who are "weathering" the program's debut in Michigan.

Hunter success tripled and bird releases doubled in November after a modest start in October but both tailed off to the opening month's level in December due to unfavorable weather.

Operations for the three-month period centered mainly on pheasant hunting. Bird recovery by hunters averaged considerably below the maximum rate allowed by current Department regulations.

However, recovery rates were near this limit at several commercial preserves while at some other preserves this percentage take could have been exceeded.

The Department's game division plans to send questionnaires to operators shortly after pheasant and duck hunting close at preserves March 15. Many operators have already recommended an earlier opening date and there is some sentiment for a higher percentage take of birds.

# Trout-Stocked Lakes in Oakland County

The following lakes in Oakland county were recently stocked with rainbow trout by the Conservation Department.

Alderman Lake in Highland township; Cedar Island, Oxbow, and Sugden lakes in White Lake township; Cemetary and Deer lakes in Independence township; Crotched lake in Holly township; East and West Bridge lakes in Springfield township.

In Waterford township were Elizabeth, Maceday, Lotus, Mohawk, Schoolhouse and Little Silver lakes; Orchard and Union lakes in West Bloomfield township; Square lake in Bloomfield township; and REED LAKE IN COMMERCE TOWNSHIP.

The above lakes are open to the extended fall season ending November 30 for taking rainbow trout by hook and line.

Lake trout were stocked in Cass lake in Waterford and West Bloomfield townships, and Maceday lake in Waterford township.

Streams stocked with trout in

Oakland county are: Clinton river in Waterford township, Duck Creek and Wildwood lake outlet in Groveland township, Huron river in White Lake township, Kearsley Creek in Brandon and Groveland townships, Paint Creek and Spring Creek in Oakland township, and Trout Creek in Orion township.

Special trout ponds in Oakland county are Bald Mountain in Oakland township, Davisburg in Springfield township, and Fenton Rearing Ponds No. 1 and No 2 in Ross township.

For regulations see "Special Trout Fishing Ponds" in the current Fish Law Digest.

# Bounty Payments Keep Increasing

Bounty payments for foxes, coyotes, wolves and bobcats rose from \$209,000 in 1957 to approximately \$226,700 last year.

This marked the third straight year payments have reached the \$200,000 bracket.

The largest increase was recorded for bountied foxes which totaled 31,942 compared with 27,629 in 1957. Bobcat bounties were up slightly from 762 in 1957 to 804 last year.

Payments for coyotes dropped to 3,601; 3,859 were bountied during the preceding year. Bountied wolves remained the same at seven.

# Completes State Waterfowl Survey

The Conservation Department recently conducted its annual Michigan winter waterfowl survey in cooperation with the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.

Data from the survey were forwarded to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Each year this federal agency assembles and interprets information from all states for incorporation into a nation-wide inventory of waterfowl populations.

Most concentration areas were made by Department biologists at areas not covered by air. The U.S. Coast Guard provided a plane for surveying open Great Lakes waters in the north.

Approximately 75 percent of the waterfowl were located on open waters in southeastern Michigan, mainly along the Detroit River and Lake Erie. Wintering geese were observed in the southwest part of the state along the Kalamazoo and St. Joseph rivers. A flock was also wintering in the upper Huron River valley.

Despite severe weather, wintering populations were comparable to the preceding 10-year average. Duck populations showed a 28 percent increase above last year; scaup and golden-eyes made the greatest jump. A 37 percent decrease from 1958 was noted in wintering Canada geese.

These Michigan figures are

not indicative of population trends. However, when applied on a comparative basis for the nation, they provide reliable estimates of parent brood stock for the coming year.

A more comprehensive report, summarizing inventory data for the continent and the Mississippi Flyway, in which Michigan is listed, will be available at a later date.
