Losses are variously estimated from \$100,000 to \$1,000,000, and fruit growers are organizing a fight to remove the fox bounty. The Conservation Department tells us that the red fox is the best weapon in mouse control and bounty records show

that more fox are bountied in the Grand Traverse area than anywhere in the state.

Here is real visible proof that nature keeps itself in balance. Fox feed on mice, but fox are bountied as predators. We are reminded that all the sport fishermen and commercial fishermen don't even make a dent in the smelt population, but when Mother Nature steps in as she did a few years ago, the smelt practically disappear.

The \$100,000 plus, that is annually paid in bounties, comes out of the hunting and fishing license dollars of you and all the sportsmen of Michigan. Everett Tucker, Chief of the Enforcement Division of the Conservation Department, told me that the Department opposes the proposed Hunter Safety Law because the necessary administration funds would have to come from the Game Protection Fund. What a wonderful opportunity to save countless lives by eliminating the bounties and using some of the savings to finance this life saving law.

Clarence Wein, Athletics, reported practice for the Little Leaguers was underway and requested those present to bring any boys in the 9 to 12 year age bracket out for the team.

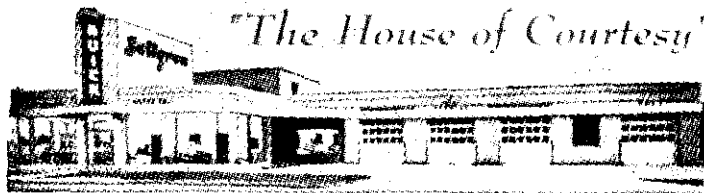
President Payne asked for a show of hands for those interested in a group insurance policy. Some 14 hands were in evidence, and the matter will be gone into further.

## Conservationists Are Upset About Refuge Drilling

Michigan conservationists are aroused over exploratory oil drilling on a choice state wildlife area. They are shocked at the new turn of events after only recently beating back an attempted mining invasion of the Porcupine Mountains State Park.

Oil well drilling equipment was moved into the Swan Creek Wildlife Area at a point favored by sportsmen for waterfowl hunting. The operator lawfully operated under a federal lease which, conservationists say should never have been granted. "Who goofed, and why," they ask?

The U.S. Forest Service transferred the area to the State of Michigan (Department of Conservation) in 1951 but, as per standard procedure, the federal government retained the sub-surface oil and mineral rights.

The oil and mineral rights then were placed under the Bureau of Lands Management for administration. Apparently nobody advised BLM that the surface lands constituted a special use area so an application for the oil drilling lease was handled routinely in 1955 and granted in 1956. The lease was for five years, with extension options possible should oil be found.

The Bureau of Lands Management now has an informal policy of notifying surface owners of lease applications for oil or minerals. A clause in the lease requires good management of surface lands. The operator was cooperative and the drilling turned out to be unsuccessful; yet, conservationists are demanding additional safeguards to prevent such an invasion in the future.

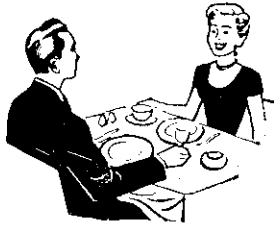

## Your Free Book On Michigan Deer

Lansing, April — "Michigan Whitetails," an 80-page review of the state's deer situation is now available free from the conservation Department.

The publication, produced through federal aid of Pittman-Robertson funds, is co-authored by David H. Jenkins, game

mammalogist, and Ilo Bartlett, deer specialist. Illustrations were by Oscar Warbach, biologist and artist.

Written in the language of the layman, the booklet is designed to give the reader a history of Michigan's deer herd as well as the Department's deer management policies and other factors affecting the fortunes of the popular whitetail.

Information presented in this booklet is based on contributions from the Department's staff including research findings from the wildlife experiment stations at Houghton Lake and Cusino.

The booklet's release comes at a fitting time as Michigan's deer herd emerges from one of the most severe winters it has

encountered in many years.

## Oppose Diversion

Conservationists in many Great Lakes states and Canada are opposing H. R. 1, which would divert additional water (1,000 cu. ft. per second) from Lake Michigan for the purpose of flushing Chicago area sewage into the Mississippi River watershed. Chicago claims the diversion would reduce the lake level by only one inch per year but conservationists question the figure and fear damage to fish reproduction, waterfowl habitat and recreational installations such as park beaches and boat docks and landings. Others say the increased diversion would adversely affect shipping and hydroelectric power generation throughout the entire Great Lakes area.
