Sling Shot Specialists Will Feature August 19th Meeting Fathers Will Bring Sons

Roy "Red" Ollis and Don Moyer, sling shot specialists, will demonstrate their skills at the Wednesday, August 19 membership meeting at M. L. C. A. Father and Son night will also be observed.

The sling shot, which originated in Biblical days and is one of the oldest known weapons of man, is Michigan's newest legal hunting weapon. Modernized to killing accuracy, it is being adopted by sportsmen who like to get their game by skill and stalking.

Michigan is the first state to officially recognize the deadly accuracy of slings and put them in the same class as a revolver. Carrying a concealed slingshot is the equivalent of carrying a concealed revolver and violators are subject to weapons' laws.

Western Wayne County Sportsmen's Club is the only club in Michigan with a sling-shot team, but it has no one to shoot against. After seeing Ollis and Moyer in action perhaps enough Multi-Lakers will be interested to organize a

group. We certainly have perfect facilities for it.

At 30 feet Ollis and Moyer have outshot a group of expert archers.

Invitation

This is the one night of the year that we encourage Multi-Lakers to bring their sons with them. Special prizes will be offered for the boys.

If you don't have a son, go out and borrow one from the neighbors. Steal one if necessary, but bring one with you. Meeting will get underway promptly at 8 p.m.

Sparse June Rainfall Nets Low Lake Levels

June's sparse rainfall continuing into early July sent hopes plunging for normal water levels in Michigan's inland lakes this summer.

Rainfall in June was below normal throughout most of the state, according to information compiled from U. S. Geological Survey and U. S. Weather Bureau reports. Only the eastern and western tips of the upper peninsula received above-normal rainfall during the month.

As a result, inland lake levels continued to drop in the southern lower peninsula. They were 0.2 to 0.4 feet below the 15-year median for June.

Lake levels in the northern lower peninsula have also shown a general decline. In most areas, levels are 0.1 to 0.5 feet below the 10-year median.

In the upper peninsula, lake levels are slightly below normal.

Resident Vs. Non-Resident

Years ago, the non-resident sportsman was a popular "whipping boy" in many state fishing and hunting circles. It was argued that, since he allegedly took a disproportionately large share of the fish and game, he should be penalized by paying high non-resident license fees. Essentially, of course, this is little more than a variant on the old scheme of getting something for nothing—i.e., let the visitor pay for the maintenance of the "native's sport!"

Times are changing. Nowadays, the tourist is a welcome sight rather than someone to scare away. Also it's becoming recognized that non-residents, unless well guided (for which

they pay well) generally harvest far less fish and game than resident sportsmen. Furthermore, "free-loading" of the many on the few has fallen in-to disrepute.

And there are too few tourist sportsmen to carry the necessary load in any case. Nationally, for example, there are fewer than one-sixth as many non-residents as resident fishing license buyers. But the real pinch comes when the resident of one state himself becomes a non-resident elsewhere. . .

Latest bit of evidence relative to all this comes from Idaho. A statewide fishing harvest survey by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game set the record straight.

It turned out that the "average" resident angler in Idaho caught 78 fish in a season of which 52 were trout. For a maximum license cost of \$2.50 he caught fish having a food value alone of \$22.45. He reaped a re-

turn of over \$9.00 for each license dollar spent.

On the other hand, the "average" non-resident angler caught 48 fish, of which 27 were trout. For a maximum license cost of \$12.00 he caught fish with a food value alone of \$13.-44. This represents a return of \$1.12 for each license dollar spent.

Duck Hunting Prospects Not Too Good

Production hopes continue to dwindle for millions of North America's waterfowl in Canada, according to a recent release of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Forced from their customary nesting grounds by a severe drought in the southern provinces, these birds found little relief in northern Canada where the ice breakup was unusually late this year.

The Mississippi Flyway, in which Michigan is included, relies on these provinces for most of its duck population. Just how well waterfowl hunters will fare in Michigan this fall is still unknown, however. The picture will be clearer after Conservation Department workers have completed brood surveys to determine Michigan's

native waterfowl production this year.

In 1955 the peak of good water years there were an estimated 6,250,000 potholes and ponds in the southern portions of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba and in North Dakota.

Survey crews this year estimate a 68 percent drop in these water areas compared with the 1955 figure. In other words, potholes and ponds number slightly more than 2,000,000.

Population estimates indicate that the breeding pair totals are about the same or possibly slightly less than last year.

However, the mallard breeding population is estimated to be 19 percent below the 1958 figure; pintails are 11 percent below last year; canvasbacks are down 36 percent from 1958.

The final survey of the year, to determine nesting success, begins early this month. It will bear considerable weight in fixing shooting days and bag limits for the fall season.

Bear Hunters Require Stamp

Legislation this year has enhanced and protected the status of Michigan's bear as a big game animal.

An amendment to the state's game law requires that those hunting bears on small game licenses must have a special \$2.00 bear stamp. A metal seal will be issued with each stamp similar to the one used for deer.

Bears may still be hunted during deer seasons on a deer license. No stamp or seal will be required.

Purpose of the stamp is to eliminate indiscriminate killing of bears. The burly animals have long been regarded by many hunters as a valuable big game species in Michigan.

One complication will occur in the upper peninsula. Since the "early fall" bear season—September 1-15—precedes the 1959 small game season there, bear hunters must attach the stamp to their 1958 small game licenses. When the regular bear season opens October 1, the 1959 license must be carried along with the 1958 license.

Bear stamps and seals are available through mail or personal application at the Conservation Department's Lansing office. They may be obtained at all Department district headquarters and the Highway Department's information office at Mackinac City after August 10.

Change Oil, Gas Drilling Regulations

Several changes went into effect in July governing oil and gas drilling operations at formation pools in Gladwin, Midland and Hillsdale counties.

The new regulations were approved following a public hearing held in Lansing by Supervisor of Wells, Gerald E. Eddy, and the Oil Advisory Board.

According to orders issued by Eddy, 40-acre drilling units were established in the Saginaw Sand Series of Midland and Gladwin counties. The adopted spacing pattern permits one well in the center of each unit.

These regulations involve wells drilled for dry natural gas in and around section 5 of Edenville township, Midland county, and parts of three sections in Tobacco township, Gladwin county.

In other action, the 20-acre spacing pattern in the Scipio Trenton-Black River pool of Hillsdale county was extended southeastward to cover 20 sections in Scipio, Fayette, Moscow and Adams townships where production appears promising.

A maximum daily oil allowable of 75 barrels per well was established in the Hay township extension at the North Buckeye field of Gladwin county.

The limit was set after evidence revealed that higher producing rates could result in trapping oil and, consequently, the premature abandonment of wells.

Pheasant Mortality High

Pheasant mortality from hayfield mowing is high. Dr. Stanley Harris, of the Minnesota Conservation Department, recently concluded a study which revealed an average of one pheasant hen was killed or injured per 5½ acres of land mowed. Working on 368 acres of good pheasant range he found 293 nest, of which 187 were active. When the area was mowed, 65 incubating hens were known to be killed or injured. Only 18 per cent of the nests hatched eggs.



How to Cast the Right Way

There is more to bait and spin casting than just tossing out the lure and reeling it in. There's the all-important maneuvering of the lures. Those who fish more skillfully will catch more fish.

Surface plugs are great for fish on top, but they won't do the job alone. They must have rod action added to give them the proper fish appeal.

Try to develop a standard retrieving method. When the cast is culminated, start the retrieve, then pull back sharply on the rod. Any sudden jerk might cause the plug to leap clear of water. This is sometimes desirable, but many times it can cause fouling. A firm, sharp pull with a taut line is preferred to a sudden jerk which leaves a slack line.

Keep retrieving and popping

the plug, dropping the rod tip gradually to maintain the right direction of pull. A sideways pulling of the rod tip on a horizontal plane, rather than a vertical one, can do the job in the final stages of popping.

It surf is not high or, if fishing from a boat where the line is not bothered with wave action, many fishermen drop the rod tip immediately after casting a plug and give the popping action to the plug by manipulating the rod tip in a horizontal plane. Control of the lure is vital at all times.

When fishing with spoons, slow reeling or trolling usually gets the best results, but erratic retrieving works frequently. Jerk the rod tip, pause, then let the spoon sink and flutter. Then speed up or jerk again and keep repeating this during the whole retrieve. This simulates a crippled bait-fish and can bring great results.

Spinners may be used alone, but most times are used with feathers, pork rind or natural bait. They should be trolled very slowly at various depths until fish are located.
