GOOD OLD DAYS ANOTHER ROUSING SUCCESS

With the roar of the club cannon and the flag raising ceremony of Girl Scout Troop No. 762, the Good Old Days festival got under way on a pleasant Sunday, last August 27th.

It was estimated, when the day was over, that somewhere between 4,500 and 5,000 persons graced our club grounds. \$14,712.00 in G.O.D. admission tickets were sold by our club members. This means that after expenses, your club will show a \$11,450.00 profit from the ticket sales alone. Let me congratulate all of you who made this year's tickets sales the success that it was, especially Floyd Olson, who sold 65 books. He will receive the highest sellers prize of \$50 and 13 bottles of red pop. Walter Tromrell sold 37 books — he was second and will receive \$25 plus 7 bottles of red pop. Ed Cardinal, who sold 22 books, will get a check for \$15. Also he has 4 bottles of juice coming. There were a total of 31 members who sold 5 or more books of admission tickets and at the general membership meeting of September, there was a special drawing of \$500 worth of prizes for those ticket sellers.

The success of the various events that took place could not have been a reality without the help of the 151 members and friends who spent many hours working for Multi-Lakes. It would be a difficult task listing all of these workers in this article, but all of the names were put into a container and at the September membership meeting four lucky winners were drawn and each winner received a G.E. 8-track AC-DC widemouth radio, with a total value of \$200. The lucky winners were Geo. Elwell, Jim Caizza, Fred Trott and Shirley Shelden.

From the activities of the day a gross sale of \$3384.72 was derived and after all expenses your club netted a \$2,562 profit, giving us a grand total profit of \$14,112.00 for "Good Old Days" of 1978.

Again I would like to personally thank all of you, who made this possible.

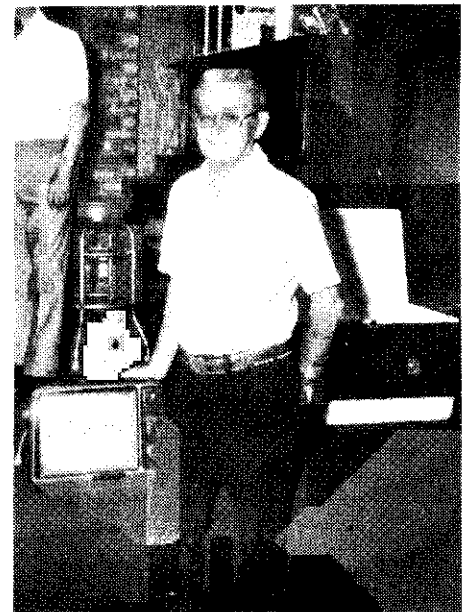

OLD TRAILS

Let's look at some history from ten (10) years ago (1968). Tom Brooks was President, Lee Hill — Vice President, Gene Hemming — Recording Secretary, Dean Ratliff — Treasurer and Dan Young — Membership Secretary. On the Board of Directors was Dick Button, Ray Chabot, Don Christensen, Ken Cracknell, Norbert Hope, Karl Kovach, George Mayne and John Whitmore.

Bob Emrick was congratulated as being the oldest M.L.C.A. member at age 85.

Membership dues were \$20 for regular members and \$5 for senior members. In 1968 there were openings for 200 members just as we have in 1978.

In 1968 the club paid for 5 members to attend the Higgins Lake Training School.

In 1968 the following members passed away: William Taylor, Edwin Olsen, Fred Aldrich Sr., James Shivas, Howard Wheeler, Frank Schodowski, William Wood, William Schilbe, John G. Allan and Walter Steil.

Committee Chairmen in 1968 included: Preston Thomas — Grounds, Ken Cracknell — Program, Ralph Whitman and Fred Wood — Sgts. at Arms, Denzil Elliott — Slingshot, Russ Higgins — Jr. Rifle, Don Mann — Fish, Jack Lamb — Boy Scouts, Charlie Bays — Archery, Ken Underwood — Skeet & Trap, Ross Bates — Big Bore and Al Meredith — Legislative, among many others.

The Year End (1968) Treasurer's Report showed a balance of \$28,891.83. Some of the yearly expenses showed: Multi-Laker \$4,356.21, Fuel \$898.45, Light and Power \$2,473.65, Telephone \$243.15, Taxes \$1,357.25 and Insurance \$1,522.95. You might compare these figures against the expenses of 1978. Remember, dues were \$20.

It was reported in the March, 1968 Multi-Laker that three (3) general maintenance and improvement projects were completed on the Indoor Range: (1) The roof was repaired (it leaked badly) by Ernie Hadish who did most of the work (except for 2 unnamed archers). (2) The floor was tiled. Dan Young got the money and R.J. Hizney and the R.C. Boyd family (Ben & Gary) along with Stan Huntsinger did the work. Also helping with the floor were Jim MacPherson, Doc Chatterton, Don Frederick, Bob Carlson, John Watsell, Gene Rhoton, and Bill King.

Workers on the targets were Dick Golze, Len Mogg, Ed Greiner, Doc Chatterton, Art Folgart, Jim MacPherson, Dell Hillman, Bruce Wright, Milton Patrick and John Watsell.

Some of the entertainment of 1968 included: Wally Tabor Show, Art Hutching's

"Adventures in North America", "RED" Jones the retired Baseball Umpire (May Meeting), Harold Glassen the President of the N.R.A., Dr. Ralph Blouch the Supervisor of Game Research and movies by Art Erickson about a sailing trip to Australia.

On September 21, 1968, Multi-Lakes sponsored the M.U.C.C. STATE SHOOT. The Multi-Lakes shooters did exceptionally well, winning the Class B Skeet (both men and women). In Trap, we were runners-up. And did we clean house in pistol, winning classes A, B and C. The Muzzleloaders event was also won by Multi-Lakers.

The Boy Scouts were very active with a canoe trip down the Pere Marquette River as one of their many highlights.

It might be noted also that there was discussion during the fall of 1968 as to where the fireplace would be located. It was voted to place the fireplace in the lounge (bar) at the September 18, 1968 membership meeting.

It also appears that the November membership meeting was moved up one week for the first time in 1968. This was due to hunters wanting to leave early for hunting season. This tradition continues today.

In 1968 the name was changed from the Department of Conservation to the Department of Natural Resources. Governor George Romney signed the bill for the name change.

Remember the Lamprey? 1968 was the first year they treated various rivers to rid Michigan of the Lamprey.

Another note: The Multi-Lakes Cardinals were the champions of the Walled Lake Little League.

This is just some of the history from 1968; a very active year.
